lazy person, Indian, terrible, worthy, short person, trusting, low, trustworthy, Indian person, courage, coward, prone to laughter

Question 2. Il Translate into English: fidemulo, ridinda, timema.

Question 3. Translate into Esperanto: distrustful, height, inclination, India.
